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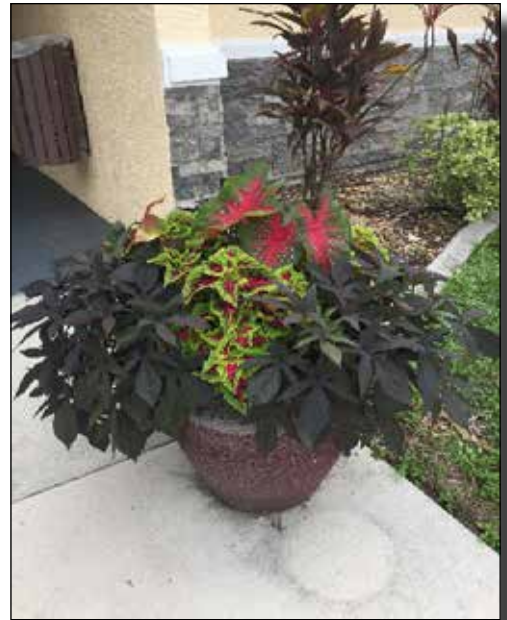

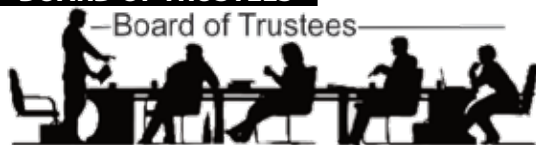

BOARD OF TRUSTEES



—Board of Trustees—

Most know that our Park Manager Tess Schofield has been out with Covid-19 infection but working from home. As of this writing, she's doing much better. Here's hoping she's back by the time you read this! We know of no other resident or employee who has been ill. It seems that following the guidelines of social distancing, wearing a mask and using sanitizer when appropriate is having a positive effect.

Speaking of the virus, unfortunately the trustees have had to close the pools over one weekend due to some residents refusing to follow the rules limiting the number of people at the pool, and a one-hour limit when others wish to swim. Good news is that we have not had a problem after that short closure. Great for the health and well-being of our residents that people are being more careful. Trustees are reluctant to limit access to any facilities, but the health and well-being of our age-vulnerable population is dependent upon following national and state guidelines and must come first. Please follow the rules when entering the office, Men's Club Boutique or participating in any sports activity or social gathering. We're all counting on it!

Unfortunately, the virus may well prohibit some of our snowbird residents from returning on-time this year. Canada has not yet opened the border, nor have they permitted Canadian citizens with government provided health insurance to cover them while visiting the U.S. Until those issues are resolved and snowbirds all over the north feel comfortable traveling either by car or by air, it is uncertain how many will be able to join us here in Florida this winter. We all pray for the day this scourge is behind us and we may resume our active lives with our friends again!

An update on projects – Exterior renovation of the main administration building will start soon. Trustees have decided to contract the work out rather than in-house like the Phase 2 building. There is considerably more work to this building, and there has been some turnover and illness in our staff which made it difficult. Bidding the project took time, and there is a delay in getting building permits from City of North Port due to the virus. We hope to have the project complete by the end of September.

In other projects, the Phase 2 pool will be closed for at least a week while workers replace the damaged paver coping with marble and reset some of the pavers to level the deck surface. We will also be re-landscaping the Tuscola entrance from Rt. 41 to the front gate. Earlier this year an irrigation system was installed in that area so that plantings can flourish year-round. The Phase 1 laundry renovation is now complete with new counter-tops, sinks, plumbing, freshly painted walls and new washers and dryers. Thanks to Heidi Brady for the colorful mural which graces the main wall in the lounge area. It's worth a trip to the laundry just to see the art! We will be closing the Phase 2 laundry soon so that it may be renovated into a library and Wi-Fi hot spot, replacing the 2 smaller libraries. The water dispenser will continue to be available in the room.

Earlier this year, the Florida legislature approved changes to HB 1855, our enabling legislation. Those changes have now been incorporated into the original bill, and the updated bill has been posted on-line at the Park web site.

Trustees approved a change to the rules regarding tool sheds or out-buildings. There now is a limit of one tool shed per lot outside the original home footprint. The building must be parallel to one side of the coach, be placed no further than six inches from the coach and may not exceed 192 sq. Ft. No

plastic, resin or Rubbermaid sheds are permitted. Other pre-existing rules also apply.

Trustees are being more aggressive in taking legal action against homeowners who refuse to comply with the deed restrictions and cause problems for neighbors. These homeowners have been warned numerous times, and have been provided notice by our legal counsel, to no avail. The only remedy left is to sue. It could be expensive for them since they must pay their own legal costs as well as the Park's should they lose. That could cost tens of thousands of dollars. Easier and cheaper to follow the rules. Trustees are reluctant to sue our homeowners or residents, but sometimes it's the only option left to protect others. One wonders why people move into a deed restricted community and then refuse to comply with the deed restrictions.

The Governor's office has approved public bodies to meet virtually, at least through October 1, 2020. Our regularly scheduled September 24 workshop will undoubtedly be on-line. Watch the electronic sign and web site for updates and a link as the date approaches.

We are pleased to see the friendly face of Bernie Mullen in the Park after a 6-week medical leave. Residents of Holiday Park rely so much upon our skilled employees to keep the Park functioning, and head maintenance guy Bernie one of the keys to that function.

Our lawn service company has a requested, that for the safety of their operators, residents please lower or remove outdoor laundry umbrellas when not in use.

Considering the unrest in the world, and especially in our nation, let us take a moment to reflect on the fact that we live in a safe, gated community in an area of the state with few unruly protests, riots or disruption. Stay Safe. See you at the deep end of the pool!

FYI

Water Line Construction North Port Utilities has notified us that they will be working in Holiday Park throughout the summer months replacing lateral water pipes, that is the pipe which runs from the water main to the water meter in front of your coach. These old galvanized pipes are beyond their life expectancy and have been breaking throughout the Park. New water meters are also being installed. Each home may be out of water for about 20 minutes while the connection is made. There is no additional cost to Holiday Park or homeowners for this replacement.

HURRICANE INFO

To all residents that are medically-dependent residing in Holiday Park during hurricane season. Please contact Sarasota County and apply NOW for registration as a medically-dependent person (MDP). Examples are use of oxygen or medical equipment that requires electricity. It is important to apply in advance for this program so, if qualified, you will be on the county's registry for transportation and sheltering at a medically-dependent Evacuation Center during a disaster. Pre-registration is required. To apply or for more information visit scgov.net and search for medical needs or call 941-861-5000.

June 1st - November 30th IS HURRICANE SEASON... ARE YOU READY?

We are all aware that the Hurricane Season began on June 1st and will run through November 30th. Since we all reside in a mobile home, we need to be extra vigilant when a hurricane is fast approaching. There are several things to keep in mind.

Mobile Home residents should NEVER stay inside a mobile home to ride out a hurricane. Mobile home residents MUST evacuate for any hurricane order given in the county, regardless of location within the county.

At-Home Healthcare & Homebound Patients should tell their home health agency and oxygen company where they will be during a hurricane. Ask them about their plans to provide care. If you are homebound, but not under the care of a home health agency, contact your physician to determine your best plan of action.

If you do evacuate, remember to take your medications, written instructions regarding your care, any special equipment you will require as well as your bedding with you.

If you will need assistance in an evacuation or need to go to a special needs/medically dependent shelter/evacuation center, please register with Sarasota County's emergency management agency now.

These are but a few of the steps you should take to keep you and yours safe during a hurricane. For more specific information check with Holiday Parks office to see if they have any more *All-Hazards Disaster Planning Guide*, *The official guide for Sarasota County. Are you ready?* The preceding information was obtained from the *All-Hazard Disaster Planning Guide*.

5 Key Facts About Hurricanes and Tornadoes

Hurricanes and tornadoes form in warm, damp air when winds blow into each other from opposite directions. Wind speeds from tornadoes far exceed hurricanes, though hurricanes typically cause more damage.

Here are five key facts about hurricanes and tornadoes from the National Weather Service.

Hurricanes

SPEED: A hurricane is a tropical storm with sustained winds of 74 miles per hour or more.

SIZE: Hurricane winds blow in a large spiral around a relative calm center known as the "eye." The eye is generally 20 to 30 miles wide and the storm may extend outward 400 miles.

DURATION: Hurricanes last for several hours and can last for more than 2 weeks over open waters.

DAMAGE: A hurricane damages structures through storm surge, rainfall-caused flooding, as well as high wind impacts.

SEASON: The Atlantic Ocean hurricane season officially begins on June 1 of each year and continues until November 30.

Tornadoes

SPEED: A tornado is a violent windstorm characterized by a twisting, funnel-shaped cloud and winds swirling at 40-320 mph. It is usually spawned by a thunderstorm (or as a result of a hurricane).

SIZE: Winds spiral around an "eye" of descending air, surrounded by a strong upward current. The average diameter of a tornado tends to be a mile or smaller.

DURATION: Most tornadoes last less than 10 minutes. However, some have been known to last over an hour.

DAMAGE: Damage is caused primarily from extreme winds and wind-blown debris.

SEASON: Tornado season is generally March through August. Also, over 80 percent of all tornadoes strike between

noon and midnight.

Fujita Scale Level

Keep in mind most tornadoes last less than 10 minutes while hurricanes are sustained and can last for hours.

Category O/F0 Wind Speed — Hurricane is N/A, a Tornado is 40-72 mph

Category One/F1 Wind Speed — Hurricane is 74-95 mph, a Tornado is 73-112 mph

Category Two/F2 Wind Speed — Hurricane is 96-110 mph, a Tornado is 113-157 mph

Category Three/F3 Wind Speed — Hurricane is 111-130 mph, a Tornado is 158-206 mph

Category Four/F4 Wind Speed — Hurricane is 131-155 mph, a Tornado is 207-260 mph

Category Five/F5 Wind Speed — Hurricane is 155 mph +, a Tornado is 261-320 mph

BICYCLE REGULATIONS

Note for residents in Holiday Park: Two items from the 55 Alive Driving Class that are especially pertinent in Holiday Park. **GOLF CARTS AND BIKERS MUST FOLLOW THE SAME RULES AS CARS. GOLF CARTS AND BIKERS MUST RIDE ON THE RIGHT SIDE OF THE ROAD AT ALL TIMES.** A 3-foot clearance between each vehicle. Also, all cars going by or around bikers must leave a 3-foot clearance. Please keep this in mind when traveling in Holiday Park. A simple test in your own driveway, is to layout something the height of a biker or vehicle and sit behind the wheel of your car.

ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE, PERMITS

The rules and regulations are designed to maintain the integrity and esthetic value of Holiday Park. We as a committee are here to help maintain this process. Permits are reviewed on the first and third Friday of each and every month. These meetings are open to all residents. Depending on what your permit is for, you might want to attend in case there are questions the committee might have. When the permits are approved by the Committee, the office will have you sign the permit. By signing the permit, you agree to abide by the ACC Rules and Regulations and the Deed Restrictions and will comply. Before proceeding with project, you also agree to apply for all city permits as required. The number for the city is 941-429-7044. If you fail to contact the city, you are subject to removal of any and all of the work being done. Also, you may be subject to a fine and possible court appearance. With all the new coaches being built in our park, the inspectors are in the park quite frequently. When filling out the permits, it is required to submit a detailed drawing to scale of the project, including all property lines and all measurements. A plot Plan and/or up to date survey would be helpful and the survey may even be required. When the project is complete, we ask that you turn the permit back into the office to be kept in your file. We as a committee are here to help answer any and all questions in regards to how you want to improve your property. You may obtain a copy of the ACC Rules and Regulations along with a two-sided permit in the office or on the Holiday Park web site under deed restrictions. The permit being on one side and graphed side on the other to help with your drawing if project requires one.
